

Dedication and Thanksgiving of the Clock at St Peter's Church



It's lovely to hear St Peter's clock chiming the hours again! Sadly it stopped working a while ago but is now up and running on time. Our church clock has a lot of history. It dates back to the Parliamentary Civil War around 1650, making it one of the oldest clocks in the country. It was brought up to the church from Bishop's Waltham Palace and installed in the church. The clock has the second heaviest working pendulum in the world and has to be wound up every third day!

Why do church clocks in England have blue faces like ours? Not all church clocks have blue faces but the generally accepted view is that Henry VIII decreed that because God commanded Moses in Exodus 39 to make Aaron the priest garments of blue with gold bells, so church clocks should be 'blue with the sign of gilt upon it.'

St Peter's clock had red-painted workings but when mended the company that renovated the clock painted it the original blue colour.

Summer time!



Over July and August, as the schools' break up, and hopefully the weather gets a bit better, many of us hope to have some sort of a holiday, derived from the phrase 'holy' day, a day or time set apart for a special purpose. But what special purpose?

What we each want from a holiday can vary quite a lot, where some like to do 'nothing', such as lie on a beach, while others like to be 'active', such as go for walks and explore. Holidays can seem very different for different people, but the key thing for all of us is that we might do something different from what we normally do, slow down and enjoy life with a different rhythm, not dictated by our phone or diaries!

In holidays, of whatever kind, the key ingredient is **taking more time** rather than time rushing by. Someone once said to me that our aim on a day off, or on a holiday, should be just to 'waste some time' and get to the end of a day with the aim of achieving absolutely nothing! The point he was making was that we need to make sure we spend regular time on ourselves...time for recreation (recreation) rather than always being busy creating.

In the first book of the bible God spent 6 days creating the universe and everything in it, but then on the 7th day he rested not because he was tired in any way, but he wanted time to enjoy what he had done: the stars, the sky, the land, the seas, the plants, the animals and the pinnacle of his creation humankind, which he called 'very good' whilst everything else just 'good':

"God saw all that he had made, and it was very good. And there was evening, and there was morning—the sixth day. Genesis 1v31 A similar idea is seen in what Jesus said "The sabbath was made for man, and not man for the sabbath: Therefore, the Son of Man is Lord also of the sabbath." Mark 2:27-28 27

In Africa they have a great saying of people outside of Africa: 'You might have the watches, but we have the time!' This sums it up: there is no point in being busy or having lots of things if we can't enjoy life. As Jesus said: "I have come that you might have life and have it to the full." John 10v10

In summary, I hope that before the Autumn comes, you will be able to enjoy time to rest or relax whether at home or on holiday. Let's treasure time because it the most precious thing that God has given us and God wants us to use all our time well – the bible reading "A Time for Everything" on the opposite page might be helpful to reflect on over the summer for what we spend our time on overall.

MY FAITH: "I'm glad I waited for God's call"

Lizzie Davidson's Ordination Journey...

Lizzie Davidson first thought about ordination 10 years ago – but she's glad she waited until now. She's gained experience of parish and secular youth work, worked as a church verger, and broadcast digital worship during Covid lockdowns. She now feels more equipped to become a Reverend after last month's ordination services.

The 31 year old was one of 18 people ordained as deacons at a special service in our cathedral in June. A further six people who were ordained last year became priests at a second service that day.

"Ten years is a long time, but it was mostly working out if I was sure this was the right thing to do," she said. "But I do think the life experience that I've gained from the past decade has been valuable."

Lizzie moved to Bishop's Waltham when she was just two, and her newly-arrived family became involved with St Peter's Church after a churchgoing neighbour offered them a pot of jam. Her mum became a Christian when Lizzie was four, and the children were baptised and went to Sunday School.

She helped plan church services as a teenager, and became immersed in the worship at Christian youth camps each summer. She envisaged studying English Language at university and becoming a speech and language therapist.

"Something inside of me was yelling that this wasn't the right thing for me, and the summer after A-levels, I had an experience at a Christian youth camp," she said. "The final talk was about death swallowing us up, and saying that Jesus had overcome death, and that we should be telling others about it.

"I then got two rejection letters, as I hadn't got the right A-level grades for the courses I'd applied for. It was a confirmation, as I hadn't really wanted to go. I also didn't want to defer, as the tuition fees were going up and it would cost more.

"I remember on A-level results day, my brother asking me what I wanted to do with my life. By the time he'd made a bacon sandwich, I'd found a theology course. By midday I had a place at Canterbury Christ Church. My anxiety disappeared. Looking back, I can see God's provision in that time of turmoil."

Lizzie became involved with the Christian Union at university, made great friends and felt like her faith crystallised. Studying theology in a secular context made her lectures fascinating. She joined a church, served at Canterbury Cathedral and was part of the chaplaincy.

"I saw a stole in the cathedral shop, and thought 'I'll wear one of those one day', so there was a sense of feeling called to ordination," she said. "It was being affirmed by chaplains and others. And opportunities popped up to speak at church and to lead small groups.

"I stopped the process of exploring ordination, as it felt too

quick and I also felt called to youth work. But 10 years later, I'm going to wear a stole from the shop at C anterbury Cathedral at my ordination, as a reminder that God was speaking to me at that point."

Lizzie returned to Bishop's Waltham after graduation. She volunteered at the church for a year and then became its paid youth worker for another four years.

She also worked in the local pub, and in secular youth work in the village.

"We built up the youth work, did some work in schools, and I was given opportunities to preach and lead services," she said. "We started alternative worship in the church hall and Messy Church. I enjoyed the work, and the secular work gave me another point of view."

Lizzie got a job as verger of St Ann's Church in HM Naval Base, working alongside the chaplaincy to organise services and facilitate pastoral work. Six months later, the first Covid lockdown started, and she had to reinvent the job. It included broadcasting online services and even creating TikTok posts of the chaplain dancing.

During those two years, she explored ordination, mostly via online meetings, and ended up with a place at Trinity College, Bristol, starting in September 2021. Among her placements was time in a prison chaplaincy and time in two parishes in Bristol.

"The three years at Trinity have been amazing," she said. "You see God working in everything, including lectures, college services, and living in community. It's different to studying theology at university because we pray before lectures, and we have chapel every morning. And everyone there is on a journey with God, and learning about our part in ministry and mission – not just theology.

"Looking back, I can see how God has worked to bring me to this point. It has been gentle veers in the road, rather than one big lightbulb moment, and each one has brought a sense of calmness and joy."

Lizzie has become a curate at Warblington-with-Emsworth following her ordination, which will give her further training in parish ministry.

"Putting a dog collar on for the first time was pretty terrifying," she said. "But I hope I can get to know the Emsworth and Warblington communities and see what God is doing there. I'm excited to live out my calling, and I know there is no way of me being able to do this without God's help."

'Prayer': it's what people of faith do, or try to do. Why? Well, if we believe in God, we pray so as to develop an intimate relationship with him, to be as one with him, in love and purpose, adoration and praise, rest, reflection and discernment. St John Damascene, back in the 8th century, gave us the classic definition of prayer as the simple 'raising of one's mind and heart to God'. And yet it seems that many people don't find prayer easy. Why should this be? Perhaps we have a rather 'purist' notion of how prayer should feel, that our prayer somehow doesn't feel holy enough (or make us feel holy?) Perhaps we simply don't know what to do in prayer: read, sit in silence, stare at a candle, an icon, a scene, yatter away with words, use beads....? Or perhaps we allow the busyness of life to get in the way, squeezing out time for prayer? Perhaps the way we pray has become boring! A lot of 'perhaps'...and there are many more!

I came across something recently that struck a chord with me, acted as a reminder to me, a frequent struggler. It's basically this and it's so simple: whenever we start any activity, offer up a few words to Jesus, so, waking up, during our work, taking a break, doing the shopping, having a meal, watching TV, starting and ending a journey... you get the idea. Hardly revolutionary. What few words? Literally whatever comes to mind and heart, but 'God, Jesus, Lord, please, help, thank you, I'm feeling...' might be some of them, whatever we're inspired to say or think or breathe. In this way we could find ourselves praying incessantly, all the actions of our lives becoming prayer, both exteriorly and interiorly. Of course the many tried and tested and traditional ways of prayer will always hold great value - it's not either/or but both/and - so reading scripture, prayer books and meditation are precious means of engaging with God. I merely offer this reflection in line with the pithy advice given by Abbot John Chapman when he said 'Pray as you can, not as you can't'.

Upham Parish Council held their Parish Council Meeting on Monday 24th June, 2024 at Upham Village Hall. Cllr Halsall (Chair) took the Meeting, Cllr Croucher, Cllr Davies, Cllr Knights, Cllr Osborne and Mrs Anne Collins (Clerk) were present at the Meeting, along with District Councillor Bolton. Apologies were received from Cllr Ashe, County Councillor Humby and District Councillor Pett. Cllr Croucher reported that one of the mapboards has been put up in the bus shelter and the other one will be sited shortly. We are still waiting for the bus stop signs to be changed to Upham Street rather than Mortimers Lane. Discussion took place about the speed indicator signs and Cllr Halsall reported that 5 volunteers have come forward to help with the moving of the signs and downloading the data - which is great. A Meeting will be arranged to discuss the management and downloading of data. Clerk reported that there has been no further update on the installation of the second Queen Street sign from WCC, but it is hoped that this will be put up soon. A Contractor has been asked to cut back the wild flowers so that there are better sight-lines coming out of Alma Lane. Clerk is still following up on the flooding at the end of Upham Street. A roadside hedge is still causing sight-line problems for drivers coming out of Upham Street by the former Woodman. This is still being following up with HCC Highways. Cllr Knights reported that there is a 30 mph sign in Stakes Lane which has faded and a further 30 mph sign which is missing. This will be reported to HCC Highways by the Clerk. Cllr Ashe said that a Grant which was applied for towards work at Upham Pond has been refused, but a resubmission could be made. This will be discussed, and a decision made during the summer months. Cllr Halsall reported that the Consultation on the Upham Village Design Statement commenced on Tuesday 28th May. Copies of the Consultation are available around the village and information has been put onto the village noticeboards, website, and commshub on where to find the detailed Consultation and how to make any

comments and responses to the Southdowns National Park. A Meeting will be arranged during August with the VDS Team to look at any responses made. Cllr Halsall said that the UpACC Group have organised a Bat Evening at the Church on 27th June and a Repair Café is being arranged with Owslebury parish. On 19th September a Workshop at the Church has being organised to look at renewal energy in the parish by Energise Southdowns. There was no further update on the Observation post renovation or from ADD. Paul Swanwick and Trevor Scott are carrying out renovation work on the circular seat by Upham Pond. Cllr Halsall and the Clerk attended the Winchester District Association of Parish Councils on 5th June. The main speaker was Korine Bishop from the Police. She reiterated their 3 guiding principles – relentless pursuit of criminals, excellent local policing and putting the victim first. The Bishops Waltham Police Station will probably be re-opening in October/ November this year. The Clerk attended the Southern Parishes Group Meeting on 3rd June but unfortunately the Enforcement Team from Winchester City Council were not able to attend due to the forthcoming Elections. Updates were given from the Hampshire Association of Local Councils, Winchester District Association of Local Councils, National Association of Local Councils and discussions took place on the use of speed indicator signs and problems with Southern Water. The Winchester City Council Briefing for Parish Councils was held on 20th June at The Guildhall, Winchester. Cllr Halsall and the Clerk WCC are having a Peer attended. Review in July with a new residents' survey being carried out with 100 residents from each ward, and 500 young people. Martin Tod (Leader of WCC) led a discussion on ideas for the Local Plan. Julie Pinnock (Planning Lead) gave an update on the current status of the Local Plan. The Budget for WCC was also discussed along with predictions for the coming financial years. The Clerk gave a Report on the Hampshire Association of Local Councils Forum which was held on

19th June at The Guildhall, Winchester. This is the first Forum and it was informative and quite a few Parish Councils were represented. It is hoped that further Forums will be held quarterly. Cllr Osborne attended the Presentation by Southern Water on the Hampshire Water Transfer and Water Recycling Project. He outlined the Project and encouraged residents to send in their views via the Consultation response forms. CC Humby sent through a County Council Report, and DC Bolton and DC Pett send through District Council Reports. Cllr Croucher gave a Neighbourhood Watch Report for June. There were no issues to report. The next Beat Surgery will be held on Wednesday 17th July in the Pavilion at the same time as the Parish Council Surgery. Reports were given on Torbay Farm and the Recreation Ground by Cllr Croucher. Work on the Pavilion has been carried out with some minor items still needing to be done. A quote was received for work on the Torbay Farm play equipment. As the quote was higher than expected further quotes will be sought before a decision is made. Other minor maintenance items were agreed and will be carried out. The next Pavilion subcommittee Meeting will be held on Tuesday 25th June, 2024. Councillors discussed the use of the Pavilion as it has been used for 2 childrens' birthday parties during the summer months. Councillors would like to encourage this sort of use and any residents who wish to hire the Pavilion should get in touch via the Upham Parish Council e-mail address at uphamparishcouncil@gmail.com

Cllr Davies reported on the Village Hall saying that new Trustees are needed, and this has been advertised. The solar panel Grant Application is in progress and the emergency generator should be installed during August. A new portrait of King Charles III has been put up in the small Meeting Room. The Clerk gave a Financial Report for June, 2024.

The next 2 Meetings will be on Monday 22nd July, 2024 and Monday 23rd September, 2024. There will be no Meeting during August unless it is required.Both Meetings will commence at 7.30 p.m. All residents are invited to attend the Meetings.

Introducing a New Councilor

Cllr Mike Homer has joined the Council as a co-opted councillor and we are looking forward to his input to initiatives and discussions. We now have a full complement of fourteen councillors which is a good position for the Council to be in with lots of experience and skills to offer and share for the benefit of the town.

Skate Jam

The Parish Council has organised a Skate Jam to celebrate the completion of the redesigned Skate Zone at Priory Park. Do put the event, which will be held on Sunday 29th September, in your diary. This will be a free event, everyone is welcome. The event will kick off at 12pm, midday, and is open to all skateboard, scooter and BMX riders of all ages and abilities. There will be some demonstrations from professional riders and competitions to take part in or simply to enjoy watching. We hope to see some budding new riders as well as those keen to show off their well-honed skills!

Ditch Clearance at Pondside Bridleway

During June the ditch running alongside the lower section of the bridleway was cleared and re-dug. This ditch will now be included in the maintenance schedule of Parish Council owned ditches and as such will receive more regular maintenance. It is hoped that the performance of the ditch will be enhanced as a result of this work, and the improved visibility will help the Council to assess what other work could be considered to improve the usability of the bridleway in the winter months.

Memorial Tree and Bench Policy

The Parish Council now has a policy to guide any requests from residents when they ask for memorials to loved ones on Parish Council land. This is available on our website for reference.

Priory Park Overflow Car Park Tenders

This project is to expand and resurface the existing overflow car park so that it can better accommodate the visitors using the various facilities at Priory Park. Following the successful funding application to the Rural England Prosperity Fund, and the planning permission that was obtained, this project is now moving to the next phase. Tenders for the ground works will be invited using the 'Contracts Finder' website, as required by public procurement regulations. This process can be a lengthy one, but the works are anticipated to take place this winter.

VOLUNTEER OF THE MONTH



Our monthly profile of local people who make our town a better place to live by volunteering their time and effort to community activity, continues. This is part of our ongoing campaign to increase volunteering in our area. We hope it will inspire you to get involved.

This month we are showcasing the volunteering work of someone whose family has been a feature of Bishop's Waltham for decades; the Stainer family. Gill is the first-born daughter of Walter and Margorie Stainer, who were the owners and managers of Stainer Bakery from 1939 to 1985.

Meet Gill

Gill grew up in Bishop's Waltham and has very fond memories of helping her father with the bread delivery rounds in the local area – she says it was a great way to learn about people and the local community. Gill left school at 16 and went to work at Lloyds Bank in London for 9 years (they wouldn't accept her at the Bishop's Waltham branch because she knew too many people!). Returning to Bishop's Waltham, Gill transferred to Lloyd's Bank Fareham. During this time, she met her first husband who was in the army and based at Bulford Camp, so Gill transferred to Lloyds Bank in Salisbury. Once her husband left the army they returned to Bishop's Waltham and settled to have a family (son Simon and daughter Emma) and her husband worked in the family bakehouse. When her first marriage failed Gill returned to work for her parents in the bakery. She continued to live in Bishop's Waltham and married her second husband. After the tragic death of her second husband in a road traffic accident in 1985 and once her children had grown up, Gill decided to do something completely different and bought a pub in Salisbury for a few years. She returned to Bishop's Waltham in 2000 and has lived here ever since as an active member of the community.

What was the first time that you volunteered? What prompted you to do it?

My first volunteering was with the Thursday Lunch Club which I got involved with in 1983 once Emma had gone to school and I had more time on my hands. Before the children were at school, I used to meet monthly with other mums in a similar situation for lunch and a chat. One of these women was helping to cook at the Lunch Club and asked if I'd like to help too. I said yes - and now over 40 years later I am still involved! Initially I helped in the kitchen, but a year later I started driving the minibus to bring people to the hall for lunch. In fact, I was one of the first drivers of the Bishop's Waltham Minibus. I remember going to collect it when it was purchased, and I drove it back to Bishop's Waltham. I continued to drive the Minibus until 2022. While I don't drive anymore, I continue to organize the schedule of drivers and escorts for the Thursday Lunch Club. Even when I owned the pub in Salisbury, I used to come back to Bishop's Waltham to help at the Lunch Club once a week!

Have you done any other volunteering?

Having started driving the Minibus for Lunch Club, I then went on to do the Dial-A-Ride driving on Fridays. I used to go and pick people up from all around the local area including Durley and Upham.

I was leader of the St Peter's Ladies Group from 1985-1990 and was also the caretaker for St Peters Church Hall – taking the room bookings and making sure that everything was in order.

It was when I returned to the village in 2000 that I really started to get involved with other things. I became a Parish Councillor; I was on the Committee for the BW Garden Fayre (I still take the money now in the catering tent) and I helped out with Bishop's Waltham in Bloom - planting and maintaining the beds in the summer months

I also used to drive the bus for the monthly outings that were organized from Priory Court and Green Close. That used to be great fun – we had outings for pub lunches, visits to the coast and all sorts of things.

I joined the Gardening Club and organized the visits and excursions that are offered to members, and I still help with the catering for the refreshments at the Annual Show (although I've given notice that this will be my last year!).

Since COVID I have become the coordinator for some of the social activities at Green Close. We have a weekly coffee morning, bingo on Wednesdays, a monthly Fish & Chip Lunch and we organize an annual trip out somewhere.

What has been your most fulfilling volunteering so far and why?

It has all been incredibly rewarding and I absolutely loved driving the bus, especially groups of people out on excursions — the fun we had! But, I was really pleased to be able to help out during COVID when the lockdown restrictions meant that we couldn't hold the lunch clubs. We devised a scheme, with assistance from Bishop's Waltham Rotary, to prepare and cook meals for some of the most vulnerable members of the Thursday Lunch Club. My son Simon and I delivered them on a weekly basis. It felt like a very special thing to be able to do when life was very tough for so many people.

I have been very lucky to be recognized for the work I have done. Over the years I have received awards from Bishop's Waltham Parish Council, Winchester City Council and from the Mayor of Winchester. Although that was never my motivation for volunteering, it is always nice to be acknowledged for the contribution you have made.

What have you found to be most challenging about being a volunteer?

I think for me the most challenging part again came with COVID when it was not possible to do things face to face. I am not very computer literate, and I really didn't find it easy to continue with activities using Zoom, Skype or what have you, so I stopped some of the things I was involved in then.

What do you like most about volunteering?

Volunteering started off for me as a way of keeping busy after the children had gone to school. Since then, it has become a key part of my life, I've met so many good friends as a result and have had a lot of laughs. It is always rewarding to be making a difference in other people's lives.

Has volunteering helped you to develop new skills? If so, what are they?

Learning to be accepting of others and acknowledging that everyone has different skills, attributes and enthusiasm to contribute. Being open to other people's suggestions and being prepared to try new ways of doing things.

What advice would you give to someone who is thinking about volunteering for the first time?

Get on with it! There are so many organisations out there in our local community that need volunteers and so many individuals that need help – do the research, find something that you enjoy doing and jump in! You won't regret it.

Bear Grylls survival camp

In mid-June, Bishop's Waltham Scout Group ran a Bear Grylls survival camp at Lyon's Copse on Sandy Lane. The group last ran a Bear Grylls inspired camp in 2019 and they knew the format worked well.

120 Beavers, Cubs and Scouts from Bishop's Waltham and 26 young people from Swanmore joined in the 2 night camp with a range of activities to try. Bishop's Waltham set up camp in a large field at the Scout site which boasts 38 acres of campsite and adjoining woodland.

Preparations started early, with Scouts setting up their tents on the Thursday evening as part of their weekly meeting. Scouts gained team building skills whilst erecting their tents.

Camp commenced on the Friday evening from 6pm as the keen campers arrived on site and deposited their kit in their tents ready for the evening's activities. On the Saturday morning the Beavers and day visitors arrived and the day officially started with flag break, a traditional start to the day where messages are given before activities begin.

Groups rotated around the many activities run by leaders and parents. Groups consisted of Beavers, Cubs and Scouts to help create new friendships and so that the Scouts could support and encourage the younger participants.

Activities included: raft building and water rockets; fire lighting and popcorn cooking; climbing ropes and assault course; woodcraft skills and wool bracelet making; band practice supported by the district Scout Band (the horses in the adjoining field didn't seem phased by the loud drumming throughout the day!); inflatable assault course; nerf gun battle in a cardboard

maze; writing postcards home and chilling out; 'axe' throwing and the famous Cave Bus (a bus converted into a caving experience). Each group rotated round each activity so they all had a turn throughout Saturday.

Everyone was well fed through the day with drinks and biscuits/ fruit available and tea/coffee on hand for the adults (and older Scouts!). Saturday night ended with a traditional camp fire with songs and hot chocolate. Everyone went to bed tired from all the activities and a great day of wonderful weather.


Breakfast on Sunday was served before the Beavers were collected, then camp was slowly dismantled by the adults whilst the Cubs and Scouts got to have another turn in the Cave Bus, played football and cricket or relaxed playing card games or colouring.



THE RECTORS OF BISHOP'S WALTHAM Part 7

The list in St. Peters Church Bishops Waltham shows that JOHN DUKE was Rector for 10 years, from 1696-1706. His educational records reveal that he went up to Corpus Christie College, Oxford in 1671, at the age of 17, gaining his BA in 1674, MA in 1677/78, and BD in 1687. They also show that he was the son of Robert Duke, a gentleman of Structon, Southampton. His birth date can be deduced as 1654 from the above information. The marriage of Mr. JOHN DUKE Rector of Bishops Waltham to MRS. Mary Clutterbuck on 30 July 1701 is clearly recorded in the Parish Register of North Stoneham. Thus far, I have found no evidence of offspring from this relatively short union. It is, perhaps, significant that the bride was seemingly making a second marriage, and that neither participant was youthful.

PETER MAURICE is listed as Rector at Bishop's Waltham from 1744 until his death in 1750. He was the son of Peter Maurice a gentleman of Cerrig-y-Drudian, County Denbigh, and went up to Jesus College, Oxford, in 1709, at age 18, attaining his BA in 1713 and MA in 1716. He became Vicar of Llanynys in 1733, and was successively Treasurer, Dean and Chancellor at Bangor over the period from 1720 to 1748. In betweentimes he obtained a DD at Lambeth in 1733 and was appointed a prebendary of the 6th Stall at Winchester in 1740. Even more notable is that he was one of the Honorary Chaplains to King George the Second from 1727 until 1750. The Parish Register of Bishop's Waltham 1737-1812 shows of PETER MAURICE DD (Rector of this parish) under the heading of Burials in 1750 "April 5 at London".

ADULT SWIMMING



Bishop's Waltham Community Swimming is offering Adult Swimming lessons for those who have never learned to swim or are lacking in confidence in water.

The water is warm and the Pool less than a metre deep at the shallow end sloping gradually to the deep end which is only 1.8metres deep. There will be two sessions each Wednesday evening between 8.15-9.15pm, each one lasting 30 minutes, and groups will be limited to no more than 5 swimmers at a time with two teachers and a qualified lifeguard on poolside. The teachers will be in the water to help those beginners who need it and a variety of swimming aids will be available to boost confidence. Groups will be divided into beginners and improvers as appropriate.

The course length will vary due to term dates, lifeguard training dates and progress but blocks of lessons will normally be for 5 sessions or a whole term of 11 weeks. The cost of each lesson is anticipated to be £7.00, depending on pool hire costs if these are increased later in the year. Clients would be expected to book and pay for a block of lessons before starting the course.







South Central Makers presents the Makers and Vintage Market!

Garden Wildlife Notes from Rareridge Lane

Orchids doing well, dragonflies emerging, many garden helpers and hundreds of froglets

Orchids

The wet autumn and winter have provided ideal conditions for the Southern Marsh and Common Spotted orchids in the bog garden. The orchids have produced multiple bulbs per plant and these were divided and replanted in the spring when they first emerged. These have grown and are now flowering. Some of those that were divided have produced multiple flower heads providing further dividing opportunities next spring. The bulbs in the meadow, where it is drier, have also divided but not as vigorously as in the bog garden. Common Spotted and Southern Marsh orchids seem to thrive in the boggy conditions.



Dragonfly adults emerging



Unlike other winged insects such as butterflies and moths, dragonflies do not have an intermediate pupal stage between nymph and adult. Instead the metamorphosis from nymph to adult takes place out of water, directly from

the nymph. The adult emerges from the back of the nymph' outer case (the exuvia) at the head end. Many adult Emperor dragonflies have been emerging from the pond nymphs this spring. Emperors were first seen visiting the pond last year and laying eggs.

Garden helpers

A female Blackbird and a baby Robin have become very tame and provide help in the garden. The female Blackbird was within a few inches of working while digging holes to plant out Cosmos plants, in some cases filling the hole in again while getting slugs and worms. Interestingly she preferred slugs to worms but took a long time desliming them before carrying them off, presumably to feed young in a nest. The Robin is from a recent brood, from an adult that is also fairly tame. It preferred to sit nearby and pounce on any worms uncovered while digging. The female Blackbird sees us as food suppliers and has worked out that if she flies low over our heads and perches nearby that we will put out dried mealworms. We have been getting through large quantities of dried mealworms with feeding all the birds in the garden and have taken to buying them in 5kg bags as the most economical way of buying them.





Pest control - some useful insects

Some other helpers in the garden are the Ladybird larvae. They have been feasting on the blackfly on our Broad Bean plants. As

well as the larvae, the intermediate stage of the nymph to adult can be seen on the broad bean leaves. The adults will also eat the blackfly.

Cinnabar caterpillars back in strength

We had been concerned that we had only seen one Cinnabar moth this spring and that there would not be any caterpillars. Worries were put aside when multiple broods of caterpillars were discovered on our Ragwort plants. The caterpillars are a distinctive



black and yellow to warn any birds against eating them. They pick up their poison from the Ragwort plant and seem to be immune to most predators. We have also been transferring caterpillars around the garden to any Ragwort plants without caterpillars. After about a month of voraciously eating Ragwort, often reducing it to stalks, the caterpillars dig into the soil to



pupate. They remain underground over winter emerging the following spring as the distinctive red and black Cinnabar moths.

Some unusual insects

Of the many insects that we see in the garden, two were particularly unusual. These were the Plume moth and the Spotted Longhorn beetle. The Plume moth looks,

from a distance, as if its wings are feathers. The Spotted Longhorn beetle is black and pale yellow, also to worn off potential predators. Even its long antennae are alternate black and yellow. It especially likes to feed on wild carrot nectar.

A very colourful meadow

The spring and summer meadow has continued to provide colour from early in the spring. It is now bright with Ox-eye daisy, wild Geranium, Red Clover, Ragged Robin, Hay Rattle, Birds Foot Trefoil and some Common Spotted orchids in amongst the meadow grasses.

Many froglets emerging

Tadpoles in the main pond have continued to thrive this year. This is despite the high number of newts in the pond and dragonfly nymphs. The overgrown conditions and plenty of green weed have probably helped. Many have turned into froglets which are emerging. They become susceptible to predation by birds at this stage, especially Blackbirds and Sparrows, but with the large numbers emerging there should be enough to help raise the local frog population.

July is the month when all the planning, organising and hard work really starts to show results around the village. The flowerbeds have been bursting into colour and the hanging baskets and planters are really established and growing well. The three wildflower areas have become feasts – of colour for us and nectar for the insects! The annual mix at Tangier Lane is the most colourful, with plenty of blues, golds and reds, mixed with the white oxeye daisies, whilst the perennial mix at Hoe Road is now getting established with plenty of blues and purples. The two strips of established wildflowers on the roundabout are an interesting mix, having been sown and planted originally with four different mixes, changing as the season goes on.

So, it's now maintenance to keep everything looking good – watering, weeding and dead-heading, with the invaluable help of our watering team and volunteers, and the last of the summer pruning to be done on the roundabout.

Our hanging baskets are supplied by Park Place Nursery, Wickham. They were hung on 19th May and by the beginning of July they have filled out and look amazing. They are watered either early in the morning or late in the evening by our team of waterers.

The planters, along with the bedding plants, are supplied by Meon Valley Nurseries, Soberton. These were positioned mid-June and are developing nicely.

The hanging baskets in Red Lion Street were planted up by children's groups throughout the town and hung on 25th May. Last month's edition had a photograph of the baskets as they were hung. So different now. These will be judged as part of our competition too.

Hopefully, when you read this at the beginning of August, these displays will still be spectacular.

Thoughts from beyond the pond

The beauties of Bishop's Waltham

On one of the shelves in the library at Hinton Ampner Manor is a series of 18 volumes with the glorious title The Beauties of England and Wales. Enchanted and engaged, I wanted to look inside and see these beauties, but opening a book on a National Trust property is just not done. Wikipedia came to my rescue, and much to my relief and perhaps with a little disappointment, these tomes of Beauties describe the topography and local history of each County.

This got me thinking about Bishop's Waltham. I love living here as there is something about the town and its people, but why and what is it? In short, what are the Beauties of Bishop's Waltham? Margaret Hungerford wrote in Molly Bawn (1878), "Beauty is in the eye of the beholder", so my musings are personal to me, which leads to my obvious question, "What are yours?".

While thinking about why I like living here, the letter P crops up rather a lot; I am not sure whether there is any significance in this, and I will try not to preach, but these are the possibilities that I propose.

Bishop's Waltham is a visually pleasant place. It is picturesque; the North and South ponds are full of wildlife; they are peaceful and pleasing places to stand and stare. I enjoy leaning against a parapet on the bridge and just watching the life and busyness of the pond. How many places have such a delightful wooden bridge anyway? The ponds, the newly refurbished level crossing gates, the railway walk, and the numerous off-road tracks and paths make it an uplifting and interesting place to explore. It is good to see that these are not being reduced but added to, with new walkways connecting the new builds to the town.

Everyone cares about the town's appearance, from the pundits on new properties and buildings to the prodigious and phenomenal protectors of the pastoral green spaces in and around our town. Everyone's participation is to be applauded and everyone has a part to play. Just putting litter in a bin is an act of positiveness. Politeness is found everywhere, be it on the road or the pavement. Very rarely, when driving and giving way, have I not received a smile and wave of thanks. Likewise, when walking on a pathway, it is rare not to receive a look or smile of encouragement, even from strangers. People here want to act cooperatively and pleasantly.

The town has potential, as shown by how much the High Street is used for shopping and as a social area. People eat, meet, talk and engage with each other in pleasing and pleasurable surroundings. This does not happen by accident; the proprietors and purveyors of goods and culinary delights make the High Street and surrounding streets worth walking to and around, be it to shop or meet friends or family or to enjoy the presence of just being there and pondering on its beauty.

Bishop's Waltham is the sum of the people who live here. We all play our part, from the simple and modest smile in passing to politeness and helping a stranger, or helping keep the streets clean, to the more active groups of gardeners, to the myriads of volunteers and unsung heroes, to the men's shed and to the political voices. We are all part of the Community of Bishop's Waltham, and to stay a place of delight, we must all play our



part, no matter how small or large, because our community reflects on each of us as individuals.

Even in paradise, there are tensions. These are natural, as differences in opinion are a necessary human trait. Here, even our beloved swans cause disagreements and issues with parking in the town near rebellion. Perhaps the real test of the Beauty of Bishop's Waltham will be whether people will listen to each other's concerns and work towards a common agreement and good outcome for all concerned. We may all have to give a little to gain much.

I will leave the last word to the Greek philosopher Epicurus: "It is not what we have, but what we enjoy that constitutes our abundance." I hope to enjoy living in Bishop's Waltham for many years to come.



Eel Pass completed

The Eel Pass from the South Pond into the River Hamble has finally been completed. Beechcroft, the developers of the Abbey Mill Place houses, have been required to build it as they will be closing off the previous river channel which allowed passage for eels. The eel pass will allow elvers to migrate upstream from the R. Hamble into the South Pond and fully grown eels to move back downstream. Final work is needed to repair the footpath near the Eel pass. The photos show the water flowing from the South Pond through the eel pass into the River Hamble.

One of our keen members dies

Sadly Roger Pilling died in June. Roger was an enthusiastic member and competed in fishing matches and volunteered at work parties. He was also a keen volunteer at North Pond work parties and took part in other conservation work. He will be missed by everyone who knew him.

A few work parties have been held

A few work parties have been held to cut back out-of-control willow growth from swims 13 through to 16. More work parties are being held in July and September. Contractors have been engaged in mid-July to cut back the excessive pond weed growth.

Pond update

There is still a good flow of water through the South pond but the water level is beginning to drop at the beginning of July. After all the rain during the autumn, winter and spring the water table was full. The dry period from May through June into July has meant that the water table has now started to fall, reducing the flow of streams into the head waters of the River Hamble which flows through the North and South ponds. Depending on whether the dry period continues or if we get a wet summer will determine whether, and when, the flow stops.

August and September activities

Work parties are organised for Sunday 28th July and Sunday 22nd September, meet at 8:30am, working 8:30-12:30. Please come along if you are free, these are two essential workparties to complete the work agreed with the Environment Agency (EA) to get our earlier grant. A new match calendar has been created for the 2024-2025 season. Matches were suspended until Station Road reopens but it may be possible to agree access for the new season.
